Job/Career Support includes interactive group seminars, job search resources and one-to-one coaching (in-person and online). This flexible service connects community members with expert assistance to meet their career and employment goals. Resources include the third edition of our Job Search Toolkit.

Reentry Services work to inform justice-impacted individuals of needed supports. We provide

programming, accessible content, and an email/chat helpline. We are helped immensely by our collaboration with the Westchester County Reentry Task Force, the Westchester Department of Correction, and other service agencies.

VisionLabs: Reading for Lifetime is a pilot program to find new ways for libraries to serve patrons with visual impairments and emerging vision loss. In addition to referrals, we lend out digital magnifiers, adjustable lamps, and other

visually accessible technology.

Music & Memory is a program to support caregivers by helping them use library resources and loanable music devices for family members at home with memory loss.

Reconnect with Tech provides both free training

and tools (Chromebooks and wireless internet) to justiceimpacted individuals in Westchester County. Coming from state, county, and local agency referrals, two cohorts have now successfully completed 15 hours of training (delivered by the STEM Alliance) and can more effectively use digital devices and services to navigate reentry - with ongoing support in digital navigation by the Westchester Library System. This 5-year program was made possible by a

Making Connections & Encouraging Discovery at the Library




Westchester Library System (WLS) helps individuals and families across Westchester County discover and connect to information services that advance their knowledge, needs, and dreams. Whether we're delivering library materials or personalized services, we are always looking for unmet needs. In this brochure, you can find examples of our ongoing programs.



HSE Connect! provides information, guidance and resources to adults seeking their New York State high school equivalency diploma. Most participants use **GED Academy**, an online independent study program available through Westchester Library System. A small team of volunteers

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works with program staff to monitor student progress, assure sufficient content mastery, and provide encouragement to keep these adults moving toward their goal.



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Westchester Breathes emerged from our work in

the Westchester Resilience Coalition. Participants experience gentle movement, breathing and relaxation exercises that reduce stress and anxiety and increase calm and wellbeing. In 2022, in addition to our 🚝 breathes 🚔 well attended public programs, we provided staff wellness events for several agencies alongside trainings to advance this effort throughout New York State.

Interlibrary Loan Services provide Westchester residents with access to books and articles from other libraries across the country. WLS also lends unique materials from our own collections to other libraries. In 2022 we circulated a total of 7,476 materials.

Senior Law Day Collaborative, co-chaired by WLS outreach director Elena Falcone, offers free educational seminars and brief one-to-one consultations (in-person and online). This work taps the knowledge of attorneys, financial planners and other professionals serving Westchester



County's older adults. When possible, we offer a full day of learning in events such as the October 19th Yonkers Seniors Law Day, hosted at the Grinton I. Will Library. In 2022, more than 1,150 attended our webinars, and over 200 separate consultations were delivered.

WLS' commitment to advocating for and promoting equity and access is the foundation for our county-wide Digital **Equity** initiatives. Working with member libraries and trusted community partners - in the library, onsite at community-based organizations, or at community events -WLS helps individuals to obtain the information technology capacity and resources to fully participate in our society, democracy, and economy.

Community Conversations are

a focused effort to gather insights on the aspirations and concerns of those using WLS outreach services. We invite community members to share perspectives on their aspirations, perceived challenges, and recommended changes. The resulting insights will be shared internally and with partner agencies to inform our work.

The **College Coach** program, piloted at the Mamaroneck Public Library, is primarily intended for Spanish-speaking/ first-generation students who may need additional support in navigating their path to college. Expanded web content

and community outreach encourages connection with our College Coach.

WLS Cataloging Services oversees the content of the shared online catalog, which makes it possible for the Westchester community to be aware of the member libraries' holdings, and for the libraries to circulate their materials. The WLS catalogers import or create bibliographic records for items including books, audiobooks, CDs, DVDs and Blurays, games, government documents and other traditional library materials, as well as objects such as knitting needles, binoculars, musical instruments, baking tins, dolls, laptop

computers and much more. They also work on special projects; in 2022 they cataloged more than 4,200 books from the National Maritime Historical Society's collection, expanding access to people outside of Peekskill.
